Addressing Attendance:

I hate to end the term with a negative tone, but it is important to be fully transparent with the whole community. Attendance at The Russell School is below the national average and well below the average for schools in Richmond. Whilst there will always be unforeseen circumstances and illnesses, there will also be times when children may be feeling a bit under the weather or a bit sleepy, but this does not mean they should not be coming into school.

In order to ensure we are building resilience and allowing our children to understand that some days may be tougher than others, we need to work as a team around the children and promote, champion and value school attendance. There are 45 schools in the local authority whose attendance data is captured and shared and we rank as 41st This is exceptionally concerning as our context and cohort does not differ significantly from many of the schools against whom we are ranked.

Attendance really does matter. Missing occasional days leads to gaps in understanding and it is not always possible or feasible for those gaps to be back-filled. Much like watching a series on Netflix (or whatever your streaming service of choice may be) if you miss one episode, the plot is tricky to follow and the overall experience is confusing. Occasional days matter as much as prolonged periods of absence.

As a mother of teenage children, I know first-hand the struggle that presents itself in the morning. I know how stressful and overwhelming it can be to encourage reluctant children into school but it is a struggle that we need to be facing because if we don't, we may be making it harder in the long term to get our children into good attendance habits.

For children for whom the struggle is prolonged and significant, we will always work with you and support you and seek external support if necessary as well. We will also look at how we can ease the busyness of the morning drop off or the overwhelming excitement of pick up time. We want to find strategies and solutions to support you but we ask that you ensure your children are in school every day that they are fit and well enough to be.

Here's to a healthy spring term, with much-improved attendance data for all!

Staying Safe online over the holiday period:

As you know, we will be going Smartphone-Free from September 2027 and in preparation for that, I urge you to consider this during the gifting season! In order to ensure our children are safe online and parents / carers are in control, I've re-attached below the QR codes to put safeguards on your children's devices.

For those of you whose children do have phones, please remind them of the impacts of sharing images online. We talk to the children about this in school but it remains an area of concern and vulnerability so please reinforce the message.

Setting parental safeguards on your child's devices

If you're viewing this on a screen, tap (or click) the appropriate icon below.

If you're looking at this on paper, point your phone's camera at the appropriate QR code and tap the link that appears.

Follow the instructions on the website exactly, in particular setting the age of the child.

We recommend you set the device not to allow any apps or games to be installed without your permission.

Protect your settings with a strong password that is not known to the child.



Nursery

Over the past fortnight, the children have been bursting with excitement as they arrived to a magically transformed nursery, ready for the Christmas countdown.
